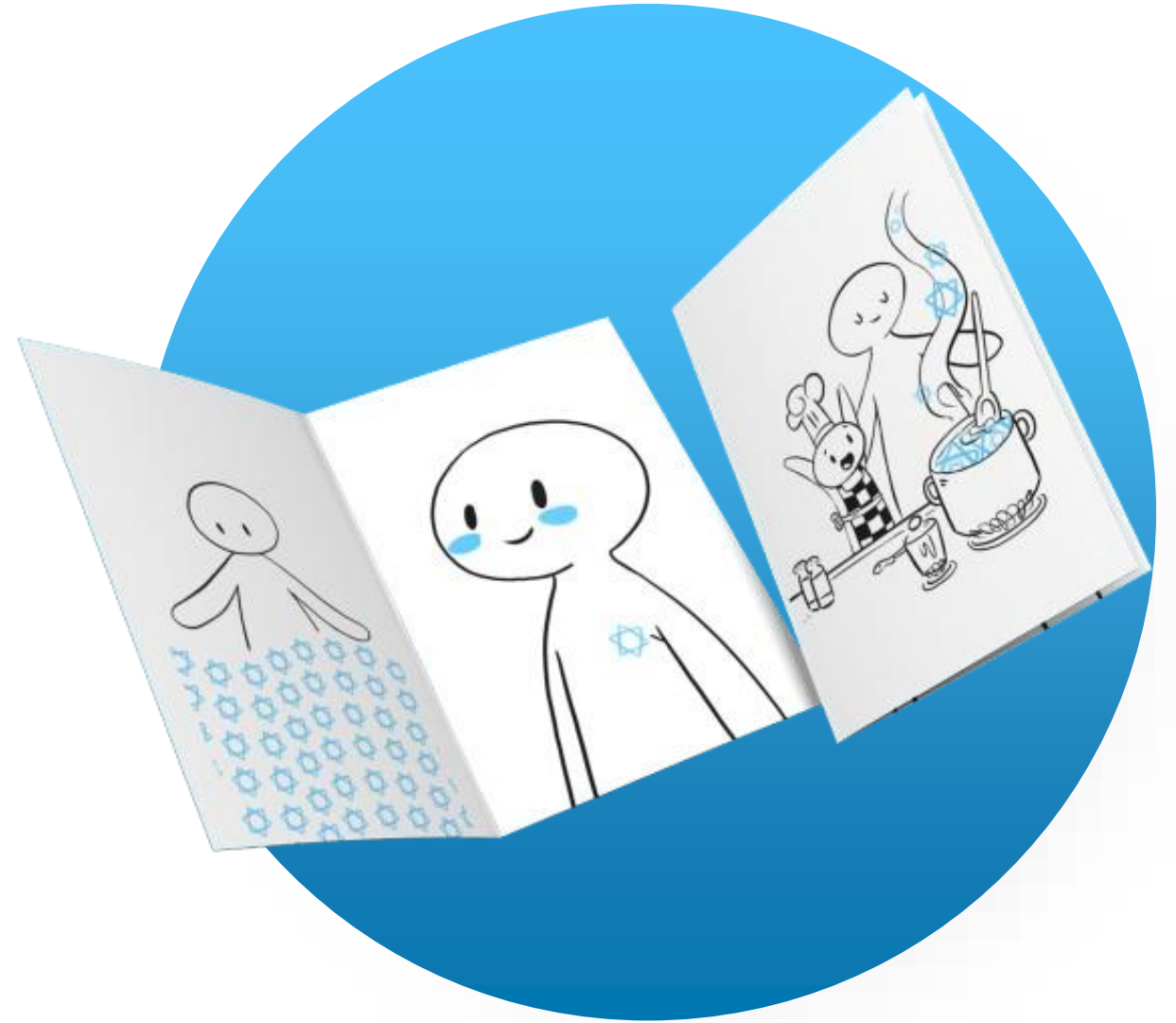
David Cards were created to help Jewish educators lead honest and meaningful discussions focused on three key questions:

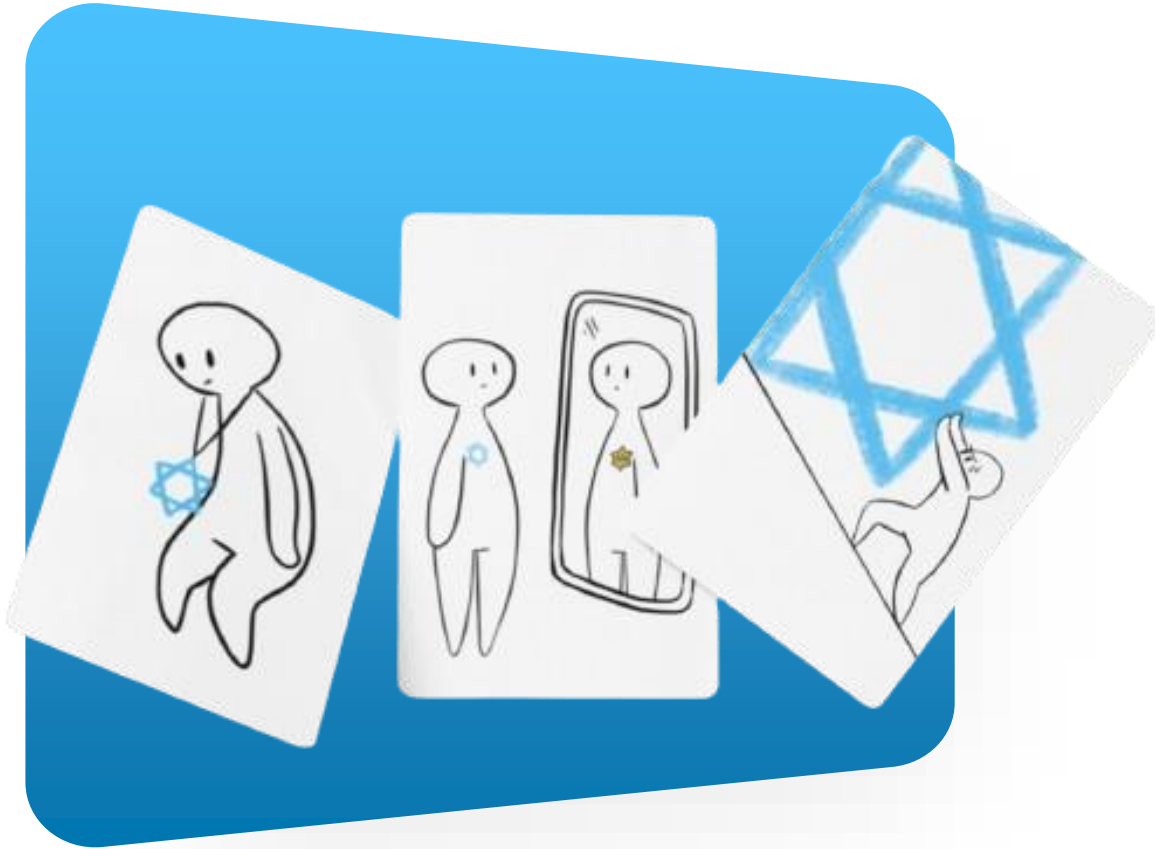
- 01 How do I view my Jewish identity today?
- 02 What is my relationship with Israel?
- 02 How do I view my personal connection with other Jews around the world?



Is it possible to use illustrations to encourage Jewish teens and adults to express their thoughts and feelings about the way they perceive both Judaism and Israel?

I believe the answer is – **yes.**





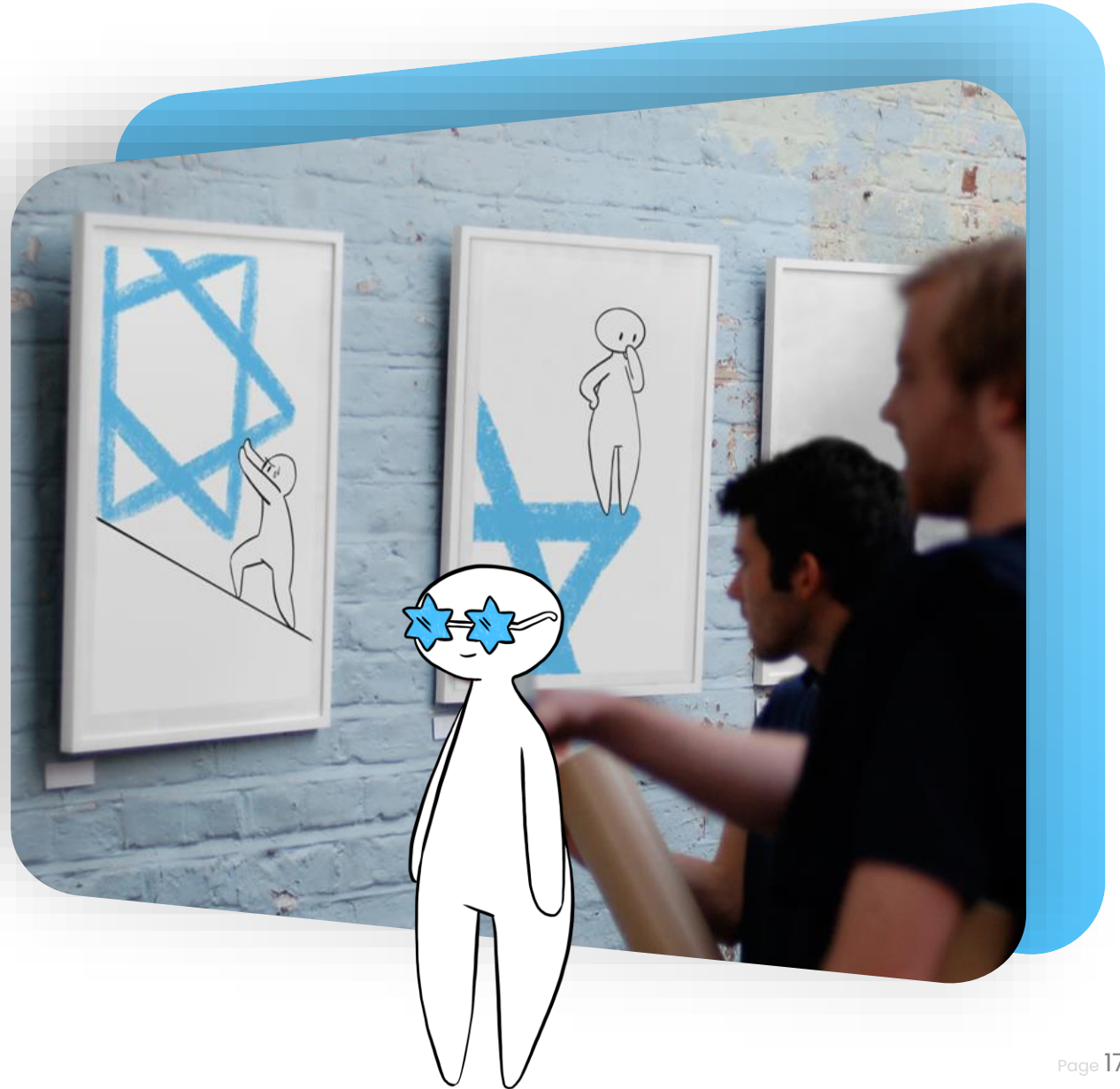
Using the cards

- ✓ Ask your participants to share the way they think and feel as they view the different illustrations in front of them.
- ✓ These visuals wish to discuss the relationship between the individual and the symbol of the Star of David (*Magen David*).

Each of these **illustrations** illustrates a different type of relationship.

- ✓ How do you imagine your relationship with your Jewish identity?
- ✓ And what about the way you feel about Israel - which one of these illustrations demonstrates the relationship you have today with Israel?

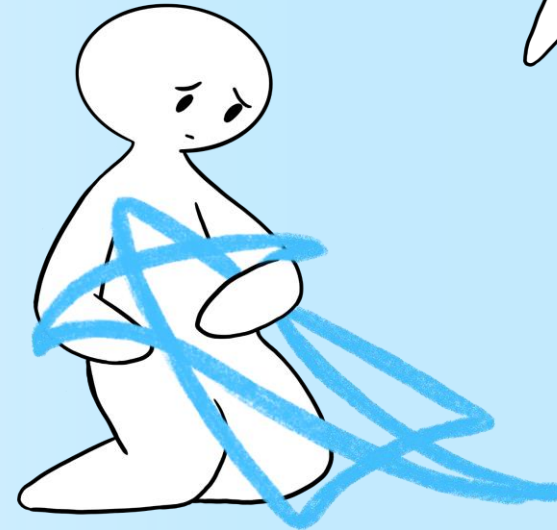
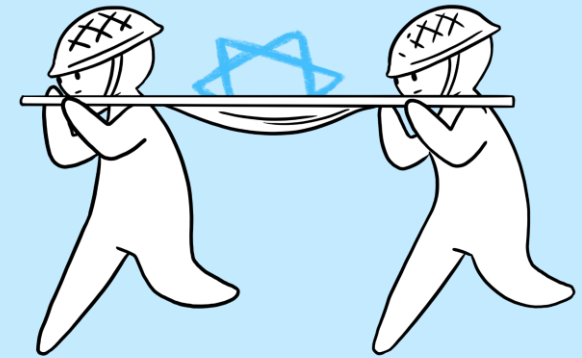
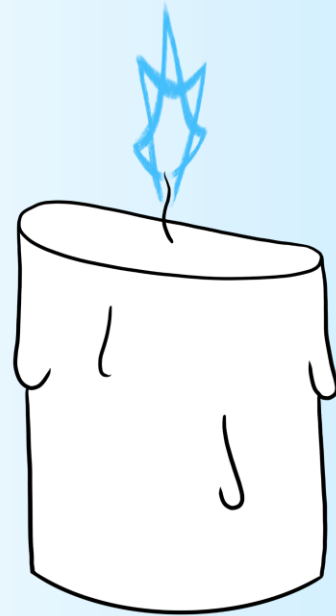

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About the creator of David Cards

Yoni Alon is in the business of building bridges between Israelis and non-Israeli Jews. He was an Israeli Shaliach / Emissary with the Jewish Agency for Israel at the Staenberg-Loup JCC in Denver (2013-2015), prior to that, he served in the Israel Defense Force (IDF) for seven and a half years (Maj res.). Throughout his military service, he acted in various roles, including as a liaison officer in the International Cooperation Unit of the IDF, connecting the U.S. military with the IDF. In the last 8 years, he has been working independently with many Jewish nonprofits on various educational projects, including Masa, JAFI, WZO, Momentum, ANU Museum, and more. He is a graduate of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem with a BA in Political Science, and a current student of the Ruderman MA program for American Jewish Studies at the University of Haifa, and the Chicago iCenter - iFellows Master's Concentration in Israel Education.
